

Trustee Profile:

Dave Boyll, Chairman

Dave Boyll of Abilene, Texas, spends much of his time volunteering.

"As it turns out, a mentor does a lot more listening than talking," he said. "Kids these days have a few more things to distract and discourage them than I did in my teen and pre-teen years."

That's why he serves as chairman of the board of MCCS, to help direct young men and women toward a stable life of service.

In 1992, he received the MCCS Faithful Servant Award for more than 10 years of service in Scouting.

Boyll also served as president of the Chisholm Trail Council from 1985 through 1987 and received the Silver Beaver Award in 1987.

"As for volunteering, my only objective is to help the organization accomplish its goals by using my talents and resources to the best of my ability," he said. "I have never really thought of what I do as a volunteer as an effort to educate, but I am sure that I have done a lot of teaching, preaching, talking and sharing ideas. I guess that's what education is all about in the end."

Among his involvement in many other religious and civic organizations, Boyll serves as board

member and president of Keep Abilene Beautiful.

Boyll graduated from Abilene Christian College in 1964 with a bachelor's degree in education and an already budding career in radio.

He began working the overnight shift at KWKC-AM 1340 while a sophomore at ACC and became program director after graduation. Today he serves as partner and president of Abilene Radio Corporation, which operates KWKC and KZQQ-AM 1560.

Boyll married Margie Coker in 1962, the same year she graduated from ACC with a degree in education. She has taught in the Abilene Independent School District for more than 30 years. The Boylls have two daughters and four grandchildren. They are members of the Woodlawn Church of Christ.
